TRIP REPORTS

Charing Cross—6 Sept 2015

Our leader, Margaret Clark had done an earlier reconnaissance so knew exactly where to park our two cars. Our walk began mid-way between The Grampians and Cascade homesteads. From one farm track we climbed on well-grazed pasture past a herd of cows up to another track which went most of the way to our 999m destination. The team sat for lunch at a fence-line just short of a steep spur near the top. If humans consider their heads to be their selves then we can say we climbed to 1000m. Our feet made it only to 999m. Mt Foweraker—Sat 12 Sept 2015

This prominent mountain in Arthur's Pass National Park was recently named after Charles Foweraker, who was a senior lecturer in botany and forestry at University of Canterbury from 1914 to 1951.

We were fortunate that Bill's vehicle could carry six passengers thanks to the "kiddie seat" in the back which Derek volunteered to occupy. Thanks to Derek we needed only one vehicle for a trip to the rail bridge near the

Mt White road bridge. A 1¹/₂ km walk on the Waimakariri Rr flats got us to beech forest and another $1\frac{1}{2}$ km up a steep beech forest spur that starts near Red Beech Stream. We had lunch at the bush-line then made our way past some awkward snowy crags before getting to the snow-field. The snow was mostly soft with some hard patches. As the slope steepened we put on crampons and headed for the NE-SW spur that leads to the peak. We got to the top for a leisurely afternoon tea while



appreciating the snowy peaks all-round.

The snow decent was a joy and even the craggy bits were easier as we took a better route. The very narrow route down the beech forest spur was much easier to push through on the way down. We had a quick water stop at Red Beech Stream, walked the final flat section, then over the rail bridge 10 minutes ahead of a coal train. We had knocked the F k r off. We had climbed 1250m and walked $6\frac{3}{4}$ km each way. 1804m Foweraker is definitely more accessible than the nearby 1938m Dome. Base-camp Victoria Street — Fri 18 Sept 2015

To mark **World PARKing Day** the club set up a "base-camp" on a Victoria Street car park. Maureen nabbed the spot at 0800 and set up with help from Kerry and Darcy. With large office buildings on either side of the road lots of staff looked out at our antics and tried to figure what our boot-print PTC banner was about. Googling PTC didn't enlighten them so they were forced to send a deputation down to ask. One "suited" worker enquired and asked to have a little lie-down in our tent to create a photo-opportunity for his fellow staff. Darcy and Kerry approached passers-by to sell them on PTC and handed out lots of newsletters. Maureen handed out cookies and offered free coffee. The car-park adjacent to ours had a cycling group with a cycle-mounted blender making smoothies for visitors. Cars were able to use our site after 1pm. Kowai River Valley Explore – Sat 26 Sept 2015

With this maxim in mind we set off from Church Corner—always drive to the start of the track in case the weather is better where you are going. It wasn't.

Ten hopeful souls started walking from the Kowai River carpark at 9.15am in cold, drizzly weather. We followed the track above the Kowai Stream, keeping our feet more or less dry, and arrived at our third river crossing minutes before reaching the John Hayward Memorial hut on Brooksdale Station. This hut was built

for Lincoln College in 1973. Hydrology research was carried out in this welcoming little building. Once everyone was inside the primus was lit and hot tea enjoyed, whilst snow fell outside. If you come on our trips, hot tea in cold weather is almost always guaranteed. When everyone was warm and fed we discussed climbing to Bobs Knob and along the ridge, or to explore further up the valley towards the Gap. As visibility was poor we chose the latter.



Following the river while staying on the terraces, was both pleasant and interesting. At times the cloud cleared to reveal the area around Foggy Peak. With Kerry at the front of the pack, and me at the back we continued up-valley, descending into a steep little side stream, and back onto the river terrace until we reached the "Kowai Gorge". We saw a couple of cairns marking a route and some evidence that people use this route. Kevin was perhaps the only person who had walked this way before. At this point it was obvious that upwards was the best direction to take. It also became evident as to how to approach The Gap, should we ever consider doing it from this direction. Earlier in the week I had discussed this route with Graham Allely, who has climbed The Gap from this direction. I did find his advice worthwhile. So we scrambled up towards the top of a small knob, below Torlesse and headed back towards the hut.

By now it was nearing 1pm (oops I forgot about lunch! – the approach to The Gap being very interesting); but needless to say every tramper has a "stomach-clock", and at precisely the right moment we found ourselves in a small *Dracophyllum* clearing that provided some shelter from the breeze. The weather had cleared sufficiently for some watery sunshine to make our lunch stop feel pleasant and warm. The clouds cleared, so that we had a fleeting view of The Gap. We continued down a spur to get back onto the terraces near the hut.

Before taking our leave of the hut, we brewed the billy once more and then Darcy swept the floor and we headed out. This time we followed the river down to the beehives, criss-crossing at the various bends so we had very wet, cold feet – better at the end of the day than at the beginning. On several occasions, some of us linked up and did proper river crossings. We arrived at the cars about 4pm.
