SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING

NOTICE OF SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING TO CONSIDER THE REMOVAL OF THE CLUBNIGHT DOOR CHARGE AND CONSEQUENT INCREASE IN SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Executive unanimously recommends the following two steps:

- 1. The removal of the Club night door charge, currently set at \$2.00 p.p.
- 2. That our annual subscriptions for the 2021 year be amended as follows:-

Electronic membership increases from \$30.00 to \$35.00.

Hardcopy membership increases from \$40.00 to \$50.00.

The rationale for these proposals are:-

- 1.1. Without even considering Covid-19, no door charge removes the need for cash in an increasingly cashless society. In practical terms, it will mean the Treasurer does not have to collect, count and record the coinage, then take it to Kiwibank, eleven times annually.
- 1.2. The door charge would remain for the September, October, and November club nights, prior to the 2021 subs applying.
- 2.1. Part of the proposed subscriptions are to cover the loss of door takings, but the increase will also cover the continuing annual rise in postal costs.
- 2.2. The increase of \$10.00 in the hardcopy sub versus \$5.00 for electronic is the final step in rebalancing the two to fully account for the significantly higher actual printing and postage costs incurred for hardcopy membership.

The SGM will commence PROMPTLY at 7.30pm prior to the <u>13th OCTOBER club night</u>.

The following motions from the Executive will be put by Gary Huish and seconded by our Treasurer, Mike Bourke:-

- 1. That the \$2.00 door charge cease, effective from the 2021 financial year.
- 2. That our annual subscriptions for the 2021 year be set at: Electronic membership \$35.00 Hardcopy membership: -\$50.00.

Night sky notes – September

Scorpius and Sagittarius - the distinctive 'winter constellations' - are still overhead in the evening sky, embedded in the Milky Way, which at this time of year runs roughly north to south. Well to the south in the Milky Way are the two Pointers and the Southern Cross.

Jupiter outshines everything in the sky, just NW of overhead, with Saturn close by a little to the east. As September progresses, Mercury will be increasingly visible low in the west, while bright orange Mars rises in the east.

The eastern evening sky shows no bright or distinctive constellations. Before sunrise, however, we can see the distinctive pattern of Orion rising, with Taurus and the Matariki star cluster a little northwards, and the Dog Star Sirius a bit to the south. The planet Venus is the brightest 'star', by far, in the dawn sky. It rises around 5 a.m.

Moon phases: full moon 2nd September, last quarter 10th, new moon 17th, 1st quarter 24th.

Arthur's Pass Base Camp - 10-12 July 2020

I last ran a traditional winter Arthurs Pass Base Camp in 2014. It used to be mostly every second year, but the response had become patchy and booking of the Catholic Outdoor Club house in the village then had its problems. However, that's now resolved by using a longer close off date and asking for a deposit, before making any firm accommodation enquiry. It was also a pleasant surprise to get the house at No. 10 Sunshine Terrace at a special rate plus occupation is now standardised from 5.00pm Friday to 5.00pm Sunday. Very practical for two full tramping days.

Base camps are usually interesting logistical exercises, but this one was relatively easy, except for the transport. Once on the saddle we crossed the spur to drop into the southern leg of the stream and continued down the stream itself. I think previously we would have climbed out a little to travel down the true left over that upper section. But on a nice afternoon it was still pleasant going in the stream, although maybe I'm recalling some No 2 fun.

Dropping down to the hut by 4.15pm, we left there at 4.30pm+ timing it nicely arriving back at the car at 5.30pm, just on dark.
