TRIP REPORTS

Cloudy Hill - Mt Lyndon - Mon 14 June 2021

Yes, Monday. On the usual Sunday gale nor-westers were forecast, and looking further ahead the weather didn't look too flash. But there was a bit of a window on the Monday so I fired out an email. 7.45am Monday, Markus and I met at the Russley Rd corner and moved on to Springfield to team up with Helen and Tania from Ashburton. It was overcast in town with ground-mist across the plains, but the high-country forecast was good, with nor-west winds maybe up to 40km/h forecast, so, no surprise when the mist disappeared near Sheffield.

After the big rain the first point to check was the Coleridge Road turnoff at Lake Lyndon. Yes, the gossip was right. The turnoff had a road barrier and the ford of the little creek was well scoured out. So, moving on, the next thought was the Porters Road. The scheduled trip was for Red Hill via Porters Road, Porter River, Coleridge Pass and up the spur to the hill. A week previously the ski club website had said a contractor

was working on restoring the road to the lodge and hoped to finish by the end of the week. But the website had not been updated all week and there was nothing helpful at the gate on SH73. So, we assumed the road was a no-go and opted for plan B.

Parking half a km up the ski road at the first bend, we set out at 9.15am in a pleasant, light norwester up to the west of 917m and up the ridge, SW to 1014m. On the ridge our four were halted by a curious falcon, happy to sit on its rocky perch and wonder who we were; great to see in the Porters area.

On 1442m Cloudy Hill by 10.45am, we dropped around the broad ridge, then up to 1345m. From there we sidled the face of 1456m to drop to the big saddle at 1250m and start the trudge in bare scree up to Mt Lyndon at 1489m. With the 40kph nor-wester on top we looked for shelter to the south-east edge and settled down in a cosy hollow for lunch at 12.30pm.

Continuing down the broad slopes, south-west of the top, we crossed 1390m, climbed up beside the gully to approach the sharp dog-leg containing point 1494m. Before the northern bend, we turned north and headed down a long way, to a major confluence in the Porter River, arriving there at 2.30pm. Tania and Helen hadn't been looking forward to battling downstream in tall tussock, but we soon found ourselves on an easy, clear MTB track, so could cruise down to the Porters Road by 3pm.

The road situation was obvious. That section of road below the river bridge had been well washed out and all the contractor's heavy gear was there. The grader driver was working, but nobody else,

so the job should be finished by Christmas. Porters Ski Field are planning to open on the 25th June, but they will need a whole lot of snow before then. Once past the road-works we still had a few kilometres to trudge down the road in calm, nor-west conditions, to arrive at our vehicle at 4pm, after a snowless but enjoyable round-trip.

We thought we had timed it well to be back in Springfield in time for a coffee. But, gosh, it was a Monday and both the cafes had closed. No problem. Back through the ground mist to home, we were: Helen Biddle, Tania Dalzell, Markus Kaufmann & Merv Meredith (leader).

Governors Bay Shoreline Walk and beyond Sunday 27 June 2021

On a fine but misty morning seven of us set off at the unreasonably early hour of 8am for an easy stroll around the upper harbour. Hank was extremely excited at the chance of riding in my all-electric vehicle and plied me with questions about the technology all the way over the hill. On the way home later, he was astonished at the acceleration response uphill. I had visited the Governors Bay website and printed a brochure with lots of interesting history, so we decided to do the historical part of the meander along the road first, while the sun climbed to warm the day and clear the views. St Cuthberts church and graveyard, the old school, Ohinetahi homestead, the jetty, the hotel and William Gray's cottage have rich histories which are well worth investigating. We were particularly entertained by the idea of young honeymooners catching the ferry from Lyttelton to wander in "The Pleasure Gardens" around the hotel. We enjoyed a leisurely morning tea on the beach at Allandale, then most of us wandered the shoreline track, back to lunch at the café, while Kerry and Kyung Sang headed uphill to the crater rim. Although the mist was persistent, there were beautiful atmospheric light effects on the water and volcanic caverns and cliffs to engage our attention along the water's edge. It was a short but extremely enjoyable outing. A few minutes after driving out of the village we rose up through the mist to bright sunshine. The Longer Return

We arrived at Allandale Domain in bright sunshine, yet the mist was still shrouding most of the harbour. Taking photos towards the sun is hard enough but we had the reflection off the mud-flats as well. After our morning cuppa on the giant picnic table, Kyung Sang and I set off to take the long way back to the car. Bamfords Road was devoid of traffic as we walked past delightful rural scenery and some nice-looking roadside apples that were well out of reach. Near the Living Springs buildings we hoped to pick up O'Farrells Track to take us into Ohinetahi Reserve. I like to think we did get on the right track but it wasn't signposted. At a gate we took the decision to climb up a spur, hoping it would prove to lead to Cass Ridge Track. It wasn't and led to a crag near point 505 which needed care to skirt, through flax, forest and even some gorse. Once on the Crater Rim it was plain-sailing to the Bellbird, then Ellas Track and Totara Log Track. Rob, a local resident and his German Shepherd guided us down a shortcut to Clem Paterson Lane which led us onto Ernest Adams Drive, past the fire station and to the main road. We were back to the car at 3:30 for a slow ride over the hill, past major road-works and home. This excellent circuit needs a little refining to get on-track from Bamfords Road. KM

Charteris to Diamond Harbour Saturday 3 July 2021

We had permission to walk on Flock Hill but when Bruce rang to confirm he was dissuaded from going. The severe frost deterred most of the membership, so our three elected to go local. We parked on the Black Rock Road above Hayes Bay and headed off on this section of the Head to Head walkway. The deck of a boatshed at Church Bay made for a good morning tea stop. We stopped to chat to two locals that were clearing a monster jumble of banana passion fruit vine so they could plant natives. Scores of plastic barrels with 2 litre cut-off milk bottles are dotted along the track so in dry periods anyone can water the little trees that have been planted. At Diamond Harbour we walked far enough along Stoddart Point Reserve to see into Purau Bay and to the heads. A well-placed bench seat gave us a good view of Ripapa Fort. We found a track that led to the café which all three of us avoided. The track that leads up the long spur to Herbert Peak got us to Bayview Road leading back to Charteris Bay and gave great long-distance views of the harbour. Back on the main road we back-tracked to the car and took the road down to the Charteris Bay Yacht Club which seemed to be no help but the exit road led to a walking track to the Hayes Bay beach. Then we were briefly on the track we started on that led to the car. This was a good walk on a clear, sunny day.
