TRIP REPORTS

Princess Bath – Mount Princess

14 – 15 October 2022

We tried to run this two-day trip last year but weather, preferred routes and who was coming from where were eventually too difficult so we canned it. Also, we had tried scheduling before without success. This time was a different story. There was no doubt about the weather and the route all fell into place nicely. We moved it to Friday-Saturday but as it turned out, Sunday would have been ok, too.

Geoff arrived at my place at 6.30am, we picked up Raymond and then Peter on our way north. The long drive up the hydro road took us to the Maling Pass car park. I tried driving up the road but gave up after a few hundred metres and parked; walking after 10.30am, almost to the pass and turned off on a well-used trail on the spur to point 1572m.

A few weeks back my battered hip had decided to throw a wobbly, so climbing was a struggle, as was keeping up with the other three, but I wouldn't have missed being there in weather like that. As planned, our route sidled in moderately soft snow, circling around below point 1906m and eventually dropping to the snow-covered lake at the western end. At 3.30 we scouted around toward the eastern end and found two good tent sites, free of snow and near the lake outlet—couldn't have been better. We set up, had a brew and then at 5pm Raymond, Geoff and Peter set out up the western ridge, headed for Mt Princess.

Often, staying put at a base can be a very cold experience, but not this time, even when the sun dropped below the top ridge. I had plenty of time to explore while watching the other three progressing up the steep slope. They were on the first saddle at 6.05pm when I last saw them and as Peter said, were in no hurry to return once on top of 2126m Mt Princess with a view all around that would be hard to beat. They returned at 7.30pm for a late dinner, still in pleasant, calm conditions.

Saturday was just as nice. The tussock around the tent-site had stayed dry overnight. How often does that happen? Away at 9am, we exited as for our inward route, this time with crampons on, around to a snow slope descending north of 1906m. We had noted it on the way up and it proved cruisy. Part way down, we sat in a good spot for ages, taking in the view and chatting, eventually moving again by 10am. Below the snow slope there was still a long way down to the valley floor,

Down-valley we stopped at 11.25am for our first lunch, with another at 12.20, beside a small stream. It was such a nice spot that we put the billy on. Continuing across the flats and Maling Stream, we climbed up to the road by 1.40 and trudged back to our vehicle at 2.40. We had plenty of time to drive out, with the usual coffee stop in Hanmer in lovely weather, and still be back in Christchurch by early evening. Mount Arthur Tablelands – Kahurangi National Park

22-26 October 2022

After a night in cabins at Quinneys Bush campsite, Motupiko, we set off early for Flora car-park. Geared up for a long day, we headed off to Arthur Hut and on to Mt Arthur. The weather at the summit was cloudy and misty and we had to negotiate a couple of snow patches on the way which added to the challenge. We didn't get to see as much as we had hoped but still got a sense of achievement having reached the top.

It was off over Gordons Pyramid and on to Salisbury Lodge for the night. There were quite a number of people there when we arrived, so we all decided that tents or under the nearby rock shelter were the best places to sleep. We spent the next morning exploring nearby caves with our very own cave guide, enjoying the tussock grasslands and being careful not to fall down any potholes. The limestone caves were beautiful when lit with torches, with stalagmites and stalactites everywhere. Those who ventured far enough even found cave spiders sitting on egg sacs.

After lunch, back at the lodge, we donned our packs and headed an hour and a half up the track to Balloon Hut. After a brief rest and before they got too settled, four of our more intrepid trampers donned wind-proof jackets and headed out to climb Mt Peel. Sometime later they returned, wind-blown and ready for dinner. We spent a quiet evening in the hut by ourselves.

When the wind blows, it sure can blow. On day three we were blown along Peel Ridge to Peel Lake and on eventually to the bush which gave some respite. Along the tops we got great views all around, back towards

the Mt Arthur Range as well as to the Cobb Reservoir. We stayed the night at Upper Gridiron Hut. Tucked up off the track and built into a very large rock, this unusual hut provided great shelter, had an outdoor swing seat and two cheeky weka keen to get any crumbs that we might drop.

The last day dawned grey, and rain started as we headed out towards Flora Hut and back to the car. The shelter provided a dry place to change out of wet gear and get ready for the long drive home. Thanks to my tramping companions for your company and the introduction to a new area. It has piqued my interest as an area to explore further in the future. Orton Bradley—Packhorse Hut—Te Ara Pataka Circuit Sunday 20 Nov 2022

Our five paid the requested \$10 to Orton Bradley Park for Bill's SUV and we must have been walking before 9am. A sign steered us onto the OB valley track because the Tablelands Track had danger from rolling logs. Images of <u>this</u> came to mind. Blue posts showed us the way to the well-maintained Falkner Track leading to Packhorse Hut. Mt B was shrouded in mist in the morning. After an early lunch at the hut, we got onto the Te Ara Pataka Track and looked down on a very green Kaituna Valley. Nearing the ridge between Mounts Bradley and Herbert we were passing through brightly flowering gorse and the whole land-block, now owned by the NZ people is well-endowed with this nitrogen fixing import. At a junction we chose to go down the left (west) side of the valley which is more open and lacks the forest tracks of the right side. From our side of the valley, we got a good view of the waterfall, illuminated by afternoon sun. We chose the Tablelands Track that stays high, then drops steeply to the car park. Our team of **Dan Pryce (leading), Bill & Wendy Templeton, John Robinson and Kerry Moore** took a leisurely 7½ hours in super weather. KM

Hopeless Hut – Sunset Saddle – Lake Angelus

27-29 Nov 2022

It was noon on the Sunday as our four braved a rainy day to go 20km along Lake Rotoiti's Lakeside Track, past Coldwater Hut and up to Hopeless Hut, a 400m steady climb from the lake. Arriving at 7:45, we didn't have to go in the hut to get the impression that it was already occupied because an array of shoes and boots was strewn outside the door. An adventure-racing group of eight teens from Motueka High, a parent and an outdoor instructor were there. It wasn't hopeless because the hut now has an annex which can sleep people on its bare floor. The ten quickly made space for us oldies and we were able to cook on the table and dined as darkness fell. We each got to sleep on one of the six bunks, though the mattresses seemed to suffer from creaky noises every time we moved. Bill, as usual, was first up in the morning to witness a fine day and we set off at 7:30am as the teens were slowly emerging from their slumber and the outdoor instructor was shaking the water off his tent. The "Mot" team departed at 8:30.

Up-valley, forest gave way to scrub and then scree. Our four didn't go far enough to catch the zig-zag up the scree, so had to do a long diagonal to get above the cascades that drain from the first tarn. Where finding the right route is vital, we found useful cairns. Bill and Wendy had ice-axes to handle the soft snow we encountered. Raymond and Kerry used walking poles. As we left the first tarn the racy teen team arrived. Climbing on snow and boulders with no vegetation in sight we made our way past some nice tarns and reached the 1890m Sunset Saddle at noon. Nearby 2075m Angelus Peak is easily climbed in good conditions, not today. By this time mist had descended but we could see Hinapouri Tarn. Our four were now following well-trodden snow prints left by the Mot people, down rock and slushy snow on snow-grass.

We arrived at Angelus Hut by 2pm to greet the teen team and relax. For the teens it was just a snack stop. They headed off for the road-end along Robert Ridge in mist and a cold wind! The hut filled to ¾ capacity over the afternoon. Two of the visitors were a young Japanese honeymoon couple, so Raymond was able to converse with them. The hut was still in winter mode, with no sinks available and water came from the lake, so "boil water" signs were prominent. Bill used the snow shovel to clear the deck of 4cm of snow. During the afternoon the lake view kept changing as mists swirled. We were pleased we'd booked a \$30 hut bed and not a \$15 tent site. Our crew was one of the first up in the morning and got away at 7:30. The Japanese couple wanted to go with us because they were unsure what snow or track conditions they might encounter. They were slower to get ready, so said they'd manage without us. The descent to Speargrass Hut took us over 2½ hours, then 3 hours got us to the Mt Robert Road car park. Bill and Raymond had gone ahead to walk a few kilometres to the lakeside car park to get the car, so Wendy and Kerry didn't have to wait long. The Japanese couple arrived in good time and were pleased they'd taken the Speargrass route, rather than the ridge track.

A stop at Murchison allowed us to eat decadent food and drink tea or coffee. Emerging from the cafe, we were surprised at how warm the day was, and our drive home was in nor-west conditions. This was a memorable trip in the company of **Bill and Wendy Templeton, Raymond Ford and Kerry Moore**, with the bonus of meeting interesting people and seeing great snow-covered landscapes. A KM
